At the 2024 Annual Conference Awards Ceremony, we were thrilled to announce this year's winner, Katey Legg.

Katey has dedicated endless hours to VRPS and the Parks and Recreation profession. She has volunteered

on many VRPS committees, including as liaison to the LTI Board, and served on both the Society (President in 2013) and the Foundation Board of Directors.

After employment with the Parks and Recreation departments of James City County and the City of Hampton, Katey returned to school to earn a master's degree in the field.
